TOWN OF REGINA BEACH

BYLAW NO 14/2021

A BYLAW TO PROVIDE FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF PROCEDURES AND REGULATE THE PROCEEDINGS OF MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF REGINA BEACH

The Council of the Town of Regina Beach, in the Province of Saskatchewan enacts as follows:

PART I - INTERPRETATION

1. Short Title

This bylaw may be cited as the "Council Procedures Bylaw".

2. Purpose

The purpose of this bylaw is to establish clear, transparent, consistent and accessible rules and regularities for the order and dispatch of business of the Town of Regina Beach and the public to follow and participate in governing the municipality including:

a) Recognize the Town of Regina Beach Council's commitment to policy governance.

b) Establish Committees and any other bodies necessary.

- c) Define the specific functions, including the delegation of authority, if any, for each committee or other body.
- d) Provide for the orderly conduct of the business of Council and any Committee's established by council.

e) Provide notice of regularly scheduled meetings.

- f) Establish rules and procedures to be used by Council, Committees and Administration regarding Council and Committee meetings.
- g) In the matter of procedure not herein provided for, the proceedings of the Council shall be guided by Robert's Rules of Order.

3. <u>Definitions</u>

In this bylaw:

- (a) "Act" means The Municipalities Act.
- (b) "Acting Mayor" means the councillor appointed by motion of council to act as the mayor if a vacancy arises in that office.
- (c) "Adjourn" means to suspend proceedings to another time or place.
- (d) "Administration" means the Chief Administrative Officer or an employee accountable to the CAO.
- (e) "Agenda deadline" means the time established in section 20 of this bylaw.
- (f) "Amendment" means an alteration to a main motion by substituting, adding or deleting a word or words without materially altering the basic intent of the motion.
- (g) "Business day" means a day other than a Saturday, Sunday or holiday.
- (h) "CAO" means the Chief Administrative Officer, the person appointed as Administrator of the Town of Regina Beach pursuant to sections 110 and 111 of The Act, or any person authorized to act on their behalf.
- (i) "Chair" means a person who has the authority to preside over a meeting.
- (j) "Committee" means a committee, board, authority or other body duly appointed by council.
- (k) "Communications" include, but are not limited to the following: letter, memorandum, report, notice, electronic mail, facsimile, petition, brochure, or newspaper/magazine article.
- (I) "Council" means the mayor and councillors of the municipality elected pursuant to the provisions of The Local Government Election Act.
- (m) "Councillor" means the council member duly elected in the municipality as a councillor, in accordance with The Local Government Election Act.
- (n) "Deputy mayor" means the councillor who is appointed by council, pursuant to section 31 of this bylaw, to act as mayor in the absence or incapacity of the mayor.
- (o) "Improper Conduct" shall mean, but not be limited to, addressing any person while not recognized by the presiding officer, the use of profane language, the creating of unnecessary noise, the recording of meeting

proceedings by electronic machines without prior approval of Council and scandalous, criminal or offensive remarks.

(p) "In Camera" means a portion of the meeting closed to the public, and staff, within the allowable context of the Act and LAFOIP Act.

(q) "Mayor" means the council member duly elected in the municipality as the mayor in accordance with The Local Government Election Act.

(r) "Member of Council" means the mayor or councillor.

- (s) "Motion" means a formal proposal placed before a meeting in order that it may be debated to a conclusion.
- (t) "Motion to Receive" means a motion for the purpose of acknowledging the particular item, report or recommendation under consideration, and having the item, report or recommendation placed in the records of the municipality for future reference, with no additional action taken at this time.
- (u) "Mover" means a person who presents or proposes a motion or amendment.

(v) "Municipality" means the Town of Regina Beach.

- (w) "Order of business" means the list of items comprising the agenda and the order in which those items appear on the agenda.
- (x) "Point of order" means the raising of a question by a member in a meeting claiming that the procedures of the meeting or of an individual council member are contrary to the procedural rules or practices.

(y) "Point of privilege" is the raising of a matter by a member which occurs while the council is in session, where:

- the rights, privileges, decorum or dignity of the council collectively or the rights and privileges of a member individually have been affected,
- ii. when a member believes that another member has spoken disrespectfully toward them or the council, or
- when a member believes their comments have been misunderstood or misinterpreted by another member or members; or
- iv. when a member believes that comments made by the member outside the council Chamber have been misinterpreted or misunderstood by the Community, the public or the news media in order to clarify his or her position.
- (z) "Point of procedure" means a question directed to the person presiding at a meeting to obtain information on the rules or procedures bearing on the business at hand.
- (aa) "Public hearing" means a meeting of council which is convened to hear matters pursuant to:
 - i. The Municipalities Act;
 - ii. The Planning and Development Act, 2007;
 - iii. any other Act; or
 - iv. a resolution or bylaw of council.
- (bb) "Quorum" is, subject to sections 98 of the Act:
 - i. in the case of council, a majority of the whole council,
 - ii. in the case of a committee, a majority of the members appointed to the committee.
- (cc) "Recess" means an intermission or break within a meeting that does not end the meeting, and after which proceedings are immediately resumed at the point where they were interrupted.

(dd) "Seconder" means a person who formally supports a motion or amendment moving to discussion at the time it is proposed.

- (ee) "Special meeting" means a meeting other than a regular scheduled meeting called pursuant to Section 123 of the Act or the provisions of this bylaw.
- (ff) "Town" shall mean the Town of Regina Beach
- (gg) "Unfinished Business" means business which has been raised at the same, or a previous meeting, and which has not been completed.
- (hh) "Urgent Business" means a time sensitive matter which requires council's immediate and urgent consideration.
- 3.1 A reference in this bylaw to an enactment of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan is a reference to the enactment as amended from time to time.

PART II - MEETINGS OF COUNCIL

4. Location

4.1 All regular meetings of the Town of Regina Beach shall be held in the Memorial Hall main level, located at 101 Centre Street, Regina Beach.

5. First Meeting of Council

The first meeting of council shall be held within 31 days following the date of the general election with the date, time, and location selected by the CAO.

5.2 The CAO shall provide written notice of the time, date and place at least 24 hours prior to the meeting by personal service, delivery to the place of business or residence or at the request of the member by facsimile or electronic mail.

5.3 At the first meeting of council:

- (a) the Returning Officer shall provide council with a copy of the declaration of results with respect to the election; and
- (b) every council member shall take the oath of office pursuant to the Act.

6. Regular Meetings

- 6.1 Regular meetings of council shall be held on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month commencing at 7:00 p.m.; except for the month of December where the regular meeting will be held on the second Tuesday of the month, or as altered by resolution of the Council at the first regular meeting of the year.
- In the event of any meeting date falling on a statutory or civic holiday or any day appointed as a holiday by proclamation of the Governor-General of Canada, the Lieutenant Governor of Saskatchewan, or the mayor, such meetings shall be held at the same time on the next day that the municipal office is scheduled to be open for business.

6.3 Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions, council may, by resolution, dispense with or alter the time of a regular meeting of council.

6.4 Council may, by resolution, authorize the mayor to reschedule a regular meeting of council pursuant to the Act during a period of time to be specified within the resolution.

Special Meetings

7.1 The CAO shall call a special meeting of council, whenever requested to do so, in writing, by the mayor or a majority of the members.
 7.2 The written request referred to in subsection 7.1 shall include all items of

7.2 The written request referred to in subsection 7.1 shall include all items of business to be transacted.

7.3 Form 1, appended hereto and forming a part of this bylaw, shall be the form used to direct the CAO to call a special meeting of council.

When a special meeting is to be held, the CAO shall provide written notice of the time, date and place of the meeting to all members pursuant to section 10 of this bylaw and to the public at least twenty-four (24) hours prior to the meeting and, in general terms, of the business to be transacted at the meeting.

7.5 Notwithstanding subsection 7.2, a special meeting may be held with less than twenty-four (24) hours' notice to members, and without notice to the public, if all members agree to do so, in writing, immediately before the beginning of the special meeting.

7.6 No business, other than that stated in the notice, shall be transacted at a special meeting, unless all the members are present and, by unanimous consent, they authorize other business to be transacted.

8. Commencement of Council Meeting

8.1 At the hour set for the meeting, or as soon as all members of council present, the mayor, or in his or her absence the deputy mayor, shall take the chair and call the members to order.

In case neither the mayor nor the deputy mayor is in attendance within fifteen minutes after the hour appointed, and subject to a quorum being present, council shall appoint an acting mayor pursuant to section 18 of this bylaw who shall call the meeting to order and shall preside over the meeting until the arrival of the mayor or the deputy mayor, and all proceedings of such meeting shall be deemed to be regular, and in full force and effect.

8.3 If a quorum is not present fifteen minutes after the time appointed for the meeting, the CAO shall record the names of the members present at the

expiration of such time and announce that council shall then stand adjourned until the next meeting, unless a special meeting is called in the meantime.

Subject to the Act, if at any meeting the number of members is reduced to 8.4 less than the number required for a quorum, council shall stand adjourned. This does not apply to issues of declaration of conflicts of interest, so long as there are at least two members left; refer to the Act otherwise.

8.5 Any unfinished business remaining at the time of the adjournment, due to the loss of the quorum, shall be considered at the next regular meeting, or it shall be placed on the agenda for a special meeting called for the purpose of dealing with the unfinished items.

8.6 Members are encouraged to notify the CAO when the member is aware that he or she will be absent from any meeting of council.

<u>Adjournment</u>

9.1 All regularly scheduled council meetings shall stand adjourned when the council has completed all business as listed on the order of business or upon the arrival of 10:00 p.m.

9.2 If a member is speaking at 10:00 p.m., the mayor shall wait until that person is done speaking before asking council to consider whether it wants to extend

the time of the meeting.

Any business which remains on the agenda and which has not been dealt 9.3 with at the time of adjournment shall be deemed to be postponed until the next regularly scheduled council meeting, or until a special meeting is called for the purpose of dealing with the unfinished items.

10. Meeting through Electronic Means

One or more members of council may participate in a council meeting by 10.1 means of a telephonic, electronic or other communication facility if:

(a) the members of council provide the CAO with at least two (2) business

days' notice of their intent to participate in this manner:

(b) notice of the council meeting is given to the public including the way in which the council meeting is to be conducted;

(c) the facilities enable the public to at least listen to the meeting at a physical or electronic meeting place specified in that notice and the CAO is in attendance at that place; and

(d) the facilities permit all participants to communicate adequately with each

other during the council meeting.

Members participating in a council meeting held by means of a 10.2 communication facility are deemed to be present at the council meeting.

11. Notice of Meetings

Notice of regularly scheduled council meetings is not required to be given. 11.1

If council changes the date, time or place of a regularly scheduled meeting, at 11.2 least twenty-four (24) hours' notice of the change will be given to:

(a) any members not present at the meeting at which the change was made; and.

(b) the public.

12. Method of Giving Notice

- Notice of a council meeting is deemed to have been given to a member if the 12.1
 - (a) delivered personally;

(b) left at the usual place of business or residence of the member; or

- (c) at the request of the member, sent by ordinary mail, telephone or voice mail, facsimile or electronic mail or similar method at the number or to the address specified by the member.
- 12.2 Form 2, appended hereto and forming a part of this bylaw, shall be the form used to request the CAO to use an alternate method of providing notice of meetings.

Notice of a council meeting is to be given to the public by posting notice of 12.3 the meeting at the municipal office and on the municipal website.

13. Actions in Public

- An act or proceeding of council is not effective unless it is authorized or 13.1 adopted by bylaw or a resolution at a duly constituted public meeting of
- Members of the public attending Council meetings are not allowed to address 13.2 Council unless permission is granted by the Chair at the discretion of Council

(see Section 20). Every person has the right to attend while conducting themselves appropriately.

14. Closed Sessions

14.1 Council and Council Committees may close all or any part of its meetings to the public if the matter to be discussed:

(a) is within one of the exemptions of Part III of The Local Authority Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act; or

(b) concerns long-range or strategic planning.

- 14.2 A resolution to move into closed session shall state, in general terms, the topic of discussion.
- 14.3 Where council resolves to close a portion of a meeting to the public, all persons shall be excluded from the meeting except:

(a) the members of council;

(b) the CAO and other members of administration as the members of council may deem appropriate; and

(c) such members of the public as may be allowed to attend by the council.

- Where council resolves to close a portion of a meeting to the public, in addition to the resolution to do so, the CAO shall record in the minutes thereto:
 - (a) the time that the in-camera portion of the meeting commenced and concluded;

(b) the names of the parties present; and

(c) the legislative authority including the exemptions in Part III of *The Local Authority Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act* relied upon for authority to close the meeting to the public.

14.5 No resolutions or bylaws may be passed during a closed meeting.

14.6 No business other than that described within the resolution pursuant to subsection 12.2 may be discussed.

14.7 Matters discussed or to be discussed in a closed meeting are to be kept in confidence until discussed at a public meeting of council, unless otherwise provided for in this bylaw.

PART III - COUNCIL PROCEDURE

15. Policy Governance

15.1 Council shall govern through policy as laid out in the Governance Policy Manual, which may be updated from time to time through standard policy updating procedures.

15.2 Council shall monitor the policies in the Governance Policy Manual per the calendar contained within said manual, which may be updated from time to time through standard policy updating procedures.

16. <u>Mayor</u>

16.1 The mayor shall:

- (a) preside at all council meetings;
- (b) preserve order at council meetings;

(c) enforce the rules of council;

(d) decide points of privilege and points of order; and

(e) advise on points of procedure.

The mayor shall have the same rights and be subject to the same restrictions, when participating in debate, as all other members.

16.3 When wishing to make a motion, the mayor shall:

- (a) vacate the chair, and request that the deputy mayor take the chair;
- (b) if the deputy mayor is absent, the immediately previous deputy mayor shall take the chair; and
- (c) the mayor shall remain out of the chair until the motion has been dealt with.

17. Deputy Mayor

The council shall, at its first meeting, or as soon thereafter as conveniently possible and whenever the office becomes vacant, appoint from the councillors a deputy mayor who shall hold office for a term of two months or for such longer period as the council may decide, and in any event until a successor is appointed.

17.2 If the mayor, for any reason, is unable to perform the duties of his or her office, the deputy mayor shall have all of the powers of the mayor during the inability.

18. Acting Mayor

18.1 Council shall, appoint a member to act as mayor if:

(a) both the mayor and the deputy mayor are unable to perform the duties of his or her office; or

(b) the offices of both the mayor and the deputy mayor are vacant.

The member to be appointed, pursuant to subsection 18.1, shall be elected by a majority of the members present.

18.3 Where two (2) members have an equal number of votes, the CAO shall:

- (a) write the names of those members separately on blank sheets of paper of equal size, colour and texture;
- (b) fold the sheets in a uniform manner so the names are concealed;

(c) deposit them in a receptacle; and

(d) direct a person to withdraw one (1) of the sheets.

18.4 The member whose name is on the sheet withdrawn pursuant to subsection 18.3(d) shall be declared elected.

19. Order of Business and Agenda

19.1 The CAO shall prepare the agenda for all regular and special meetings of council.

19.2 The agenda shall include the order of business and all items of business and associated reports, bylaws or documents and shall be set out in accordance with the order of business.

19.3 The CAO shall ensure that the council agendas are delivered to each member no later than 72 hours immediately preceding the council meeting.

19.4 The CAO shall ensure that the council agendas are available to the general public no later than 24 hours preceding the council meeting.

19.5 If, for any reason, the CAO is unable to meet the deadline mentioned in subsection 19.4, the CAO shall prepare and distribute the agenda as soon as reasonably possible to allow the public an opportunity to review the agenda prior to the council meeting.

19.6 Presentations shall be listed on the agenda when authorized by the mayor and shall be intended to recognize an individual or group on behalf of council for some award or similar honour which they have received or for a group or individual to present to council some award or similar honour which the municipality has been awarded.

19.7 The business shall, in all cases, be taken up in the order in which it stands on the agenda, unless:

(a) otherwise determined upon motion passed by a vote of the majority of the members present to approve the agenda and which vote shall be placed without debate; or

(b) the mayor determines during the proceedings of council that for public interest a matter be moved forward to be dealt with promptly.

20. Deadline for Submissions/Correspondence to Council

- 20.1 Every communication, petition, remonstrance, report or other written application intended to be presented to the Council shall be received by the CAO no later than the end of day seven days prior to the date of the meeting which it is desired that it should be presented to Council. If not received prior to the required time and date, it shall not be received by the Council until the next regular meeting in question except in special cases and then only on the approval of the majority of the members present at the meeting, provided however, that the foregoing does not apply to submission of additional reports and correspondence by the Committee of Council and Administration and in its opinion requires the attention of Council.
- 20.2 Every communication, petition, remonstrance, report or written application must be written or printed and the original thereof, signed by at least one person, and must be temperate and respectful in its language.
- 20.3 All additions to the agenda by members of Council shall be in writing and shall be handed to the CAO not later than one o'clock p.m. on the day preceding the meeting. The answer to such additions shall also be put in writing and shall be supplied to the Mayor or other presiding officer for presentation at the regular meeting of Council.
 - i. Additions to the agenda shall be brief and to the point and shall be answerable by brief statements.
 - ii. Written additions to the agenda may be accepted by the majority of the members present.
 - iii. Oral additions to the agenda may be accepted by unanimous agreement of all parties.

21. Urgent Business

- 21.1 The administration may request to add a matter to the agenda of a meeting as urgent business after the agenda has been prepared and distributed by the CAO.
- 21.2 In these circumstances, the administration shall submit a report to the CAO including an explanation of the reasons and degree of urgency of the matter as soon as possible.
- 21.3 The CAO shall distribute any requests from the administration to add a matter of urgent business to the agenda to the members as soon as they are available.
- 21.4 During the confirmation of the agenda, a member may move to add a report, communication or delegation to the agenda if the matter arises from an unforeseeable situation of urgency.
- 21.5 Council may only consider a matter of urgent business by a majority vote of members present.

22. Communications - General

- When a person wishes to have a communication considered by council, it shall be addressed to council, and:
 - (a) clearly set out the matter in issue and the request; and
 - (b) for written communications, must be printed, typewritten or legibly written, contain the mailing address of the writer and be signed with the name of the writer; or
 - (c) for electronic communication, must contain the name of the writer and both the mailing and electronic address of the writer.
- 22.2 A communication received by the CAO which contains or relates to personal information shall be dealt with in accordance with the provisions of *The Local Authority Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act*.
- 22.3 Electronic format for all support document is recommended. Bound documents or studies in support of the delegation's notice shall, if sufficient copies are provided by the delegation, be circulated to members, but will not be reproduced.
- 22.4 A written communication pertaining to a matter must be received by the CAO no later than the agenda deadline in order to be included on the council agenda.
- A written communication received before the agenda deadline shall be placed by the CAO on the council agenda and shall be dealt with when the matter is considered by council at its meeting.
- 22.6 In the event that the communication to the CAO is received after the agenda deadline,
 - (a) regarding a subject which is on the agenda;

- 22.6.a.a.1. the CAO will bring the request to the attention of council¹; and
- 22.6.a.a.2. the individual will be advised by the CAO that the communication may not be considered by council unless the majority of members vote to allow the communication within the motion to approve the agenda.

(b) Regarding a subject which is not on the agenda;

22.6.a.b.1. The CAO will place the communication on the next council meeting agenda, unless it is identified as urgent, which 22.6.a.a.2 shall apply.

23. Delegations

When a person wishes to speak to council on a matter, for which a hearing is not required, that person shall notify the CAO in writing, which notice shall include the following:

(a) the name and correct mailing address of the spokesperson;

(b) telephone number where the representative of the delegation can be reached during the day;

(c) originally signed, except when submitted by facsimile or e-mail; and

(d) clearly setting out the subject matter to be discussed and the request being made of council.

23.2 A request to speak to council pursuant to subsection 23.1 must be received by the CAO no later than the agenda deadline in order to be included on the council agenda.

Matters on Council Agenda

23.3 In the event that a delegation makes an application to the CAO after the agenda deadline, regarding a subject which is on the agenda, the CAO will bring the request to the attention of council²:

(a) Delegations will be advised by the CAO that they may not be heard by council unless the majority of members vote to allow the delegation to speak within the motion to approve the agenda.

Matters Not on Council Agenda

- 23.4 The CAO, who shall consult with the mayor, may refuse to accept a request to speak to council if council has, within the six (6) months immediately preceding the request, already heard from the person and dealt with the same or substantially the same matter by resolution or bylaw, and that item is not a matter on the Council Agenda.
- 23.5 If a request to speak to council is refused, a copy of the request and reply, shall be forwarded to members by the CAO.

General

23.6 Delegations speaking before council shall address their remarks to the stated business:

(a) Delegations will be limited to speaking only once; and

- (b) Rebuttal or cross debate with other delegations shall not be permitted.
- 23.7 A maximum of fifteen minutes shall be allotted for each delegation to present his or her position of support or opposition.
- 23.8 Where there are numerous delegates taking the same position on a matter, they are encouraged to select a spokesperson to present their views:

(a) Delegations are encouraged not to repeat information presented by an earlier delegation.

- (b) The mayor shall at the conclusion of fifteen minutes, inform the delegation that the time limit is up.
- (c) Only upon a motion to extend the fifteen minute limitation adopted by a majority of members shall the fifteen minute limit be extended.

(d) Delegations will not be permitted to assume any unused time allocated to another delegation.

- Upon the completion of a presentation to council by a delegation, any discourse between members and the delegation shall be limited to members asking questions for clarification and obtaining additional, relevant information only:
 - (a) Members shall not enter into debate with the delegation respecting the presentation;

¹ This clause provides council with express authority to postpone consideration of a communication until such time as council has sufficient opportunity to fully consider the contents of the communication.

² This clause provides council with express authority to postpone hearing from a person until such time as council has sufficient opportunity to fully consider the intent of the presentation.

(b) Once a motion has been moved and seconded, no further representation or questions of the delegation shall be permitted; and

24.8 Delegations will be limited to a maximum of two (2) per regular meeting of council.

24. Minutes

- 24.1 The CAO shall record the minutes of each council meeting without note or comment and shall distribute copies of the minutes to each member at least twenty-four (24) hours prior to a subsequent council meeting.
- 24.2 The names of the members present at the meeting are to be recorded in the minutes of every meeting.
- 24.3 Any member may make a motion amending the minutes to correct any mistakes.
- 24.4 The minutes of each meeting are to be approved at the next regular meeting of the council and signed by the presiding member and the CAO in accordance with the Act.

25. Mayor and Councilors' Forum

- 25.1 Statements shall include the sharing of the following information:
 - (a) events, activities or community functions attended; and
 - (b) general work of members on behalf of council colleagues, constituents and the municipality.
- 25.2 All comments will be verbal only and shall not be recorded in the minutes of the meeting.

26. Bylaws

- 26.1 Every proposed bylaw must have three (3) distinct and separate readings.
- A proposed bylaw must not have more than two (2) readings at a council meeting unless the members present unanimously agree to consider third reading.
- A proposed bylaw will be considered by council immediately following consideration of the report or item to which the bylaw relates.
- Only the title or identifying number has to be read at each reading of the bylaw.
- 26.5 Each member present at the meeting at which first reading is to take place must be given or have had the opportunity to review the full text of the proposed bylaw before the bylaw receives first reading.
- 26.6 Each member present at the meeting at which third reading is to take place must, before the proposed bylaw receives third reading, be given or have had the opportunity to review the full text of the proposed bylaw and of any amendments that were passed after first reading.
- 26.7 When a bylaw has been given three (3) readings by council, it:
 - (a) becomes a municipal enactment of the municipality; and
 - (b) is effective immediately unless the bylaw or an applicable provincial statute provides otherwise.
- 26.8 The CAO shall be empowered to correct any typographical error that may not have been corrected at the time of submission to council and the bylaw shall have the same status as if council had corrected same.
- 26.9 After passage, every bylaw shall be signed by the mayor and the CAO, pursuant to the Act and marked with the corporate seal of the municipality.

27. Recess

- 27.1 The council may recess at any time during the meeting.
- A motion to recess must state the time of duration of the recess, and must be passed by a majority of the members present.
- 27.3 The council may reconvene sooner than the time mentioned in the motion of recess, but must not reconvene later than thirty minutes after the time specified for reconvening or the meeting shall be deemed to be adjourned due to a lack of quorum.

28. Public Hearing

- 28.1 If a public hearing is required by any Act, it shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of this section.
- 28.2 The procedure by which the public hearing will be conducted or by which public input will be obtained shall be as follows:
 - (a) the mayor shall declare the hearing on the matter open;
 - (b) the administration shall present a report on the bylaw or resolution under consideration including the administration recommendations;

- (c) if it is a hearing that involves an applicant³, the applicant shall be given an opportunity to make representations on the matter under consideration;
- (d) after the applicant, any person or group of persons or spokesperson acting on behalf of another person or group shall be given an opportunity to make representations on the matter under consideration;
- (e) if it is a hearing that involves an applicant, at the conclusion of the speakers, the applicant shall be given an opportunity to respond to the representations of other people;
- (f) council may request further information from administration;
- (g) council shall formally receive all communications and written reports submitted to it on the subject matter of the hearing;
- (h) the mayor shall declare the hearing closed; and
- (i) council shall then consider the matter and at the conclusion of the deliberations, council shall vote on the bylaw or resolution in accordance with the procedures contained in this bylaw.
- 28.3 The time allowed for each person making representations shall be fifteen minutes.
- 28.4 A hearing may be adjourned to a certain date.
- A member shall abstain from taking part in the debate or voting on the bylaw or resolution, which is the subject of the hearing if the member was absent from any part of the public hearing.

PART IV - CONDUCT AT COUNCIL MEETINGS

29. Persons Allowed at the Table

29.1 No person, except members, the CAO and other members of administration as authorized by the CAO and such persons as are permitted by the mayor shall be allowed to be seated at the council table during the sittings of the council, without permission of the mayor or other presiding member.

30. Conduct of Public

- 30.1 All persons in the public gallery at a council meeting shall:
 - (a) refrain from addressing council or a member unless permitted to do so;
 - (b) maintain quiet and order;
 - refrain from disturbing the proceedings by words, gestures or actions including applauding, displaying flags, placards or similar material;
 - (d) refrain from talking on cellular telephones;
 - (e) refrain from making audio or video recordings of council proceedings; and
 - (f) ensure that all electronic devices are silent and operated in such a manner that does not interfere with the meeting or with another person's ability to hear or view the proceedings.

31. Conduct of Delegations

- When addressing members at a council meeting, a delegation shall refrain from:
 - (a) speaking disrespectfully of the federal government, the provincial government or another municipal council, or any official representing them;
 - (b) using offensive words in referring to a member, an employee of the municipality or a member of the public;
 - (c) reflecting on a vote of council except when moving to rescind or reconsider it;
 - (d) reflecting on the motives of the members who voted on the motion or the mover of the motion; or
 - (e) shouting or using an immoderate tone, profane, vulgar or offensive language.

32. Conduct of Members

- 32.1 Members of council wishing to speak at a meeting shall ensure they do not interrupt another member.
- 32.2 If more than one member wishes to speak at a meeting at the same time, the mayor shall indicate which member shall speak first.

³ This may be an application under *The Planning and Development Act, 2007*, an application to close a road, etc.

- 32.3 When addressing a council meeting, a member shall refrain from:
 - (a) speaking disrespectfully of the federal government, the provincial government or another municipal council, or any official representing
 - (b) using offensive words in referring to a member, an employee of the municipality or a member of the public;
 - (c) reflecting on a vote of council except when moving to rescind or reconsider it.
 - (d) reflecting on the motives of the members who voted on the motion or the mover of the motion; or
 - (e) shouting or using an immoderate tone, profane, vulgar or offensive language.
- When a member is addressing the council, all other members shall: 32.4
 - (a) remain quiet and seated:
 - (b) refrain from interrupting the speaker, except on a point of order or point of procedure; and
 - (c) refrain from carrying on a private conversation in such a manner that disturbs the speaker.
- Members shall ensure that all electronic devices remain silent and do not 32.5 interfere with the meeting.

33. Improper Conduct

- The mayor may request that any person in the public gallery who disturbs the 33.1 proceedings of council or acts improperly at a council meeting, as set out in section 34, leave or be expelled from the meeting.
- The mayor may request that any delegation who addresses council 33.2 improperly as set out in section 35, leave or be expelled from the meeting.
- No person shall refuse to leave a council meeting when requested to do so 33.3 by the mayor.
- Any person who refuses to leave when requested to do so may be removed. 33.4
- If a person disturbs the proceedings of council or refuses to leave when 33.5 requested to do so, the mayor may recess the meeting until the person leaves or adjourn the meeting to another day.

34. Leaving the Meeting

Every member who leaves the council meeting before the meeting is over, whether intending to return to the meeting or not, shall notify the CAO.

35. Point of Order

- A member may rise and ask the mayor to rule on a point of order. 35.1
- When a point of order is raised, the member speaking shall immediately 35.2 cease speaking until the mayor decides the point of order raised.
- 35.3 A point of order must be raised immediately at the time the rules of council are breached.
- The member against whom a point of order is raised may be granted 35.4 permission by the mayor to explain.
- The mayor may consult the CAO before ruling on a point of order. 35.5
- 35.6 A point of order is not subject to amendment or debate.

36. Point of Privilege

- A member may rise and ask the mayor to rule on a point of privilege. 36.1
- After the member has stated the point of privilege, the mayor shall rule 36.2 whether or not the matter raised is a point of privilege.
- 36.3 If the matter is determined to be a point of privilege, the member who raised the point of privilege shall be permitted to speak to the matter.
- If the point of privilege concerns a situation, circumstance or event which 36.4 arose between council meetings, the member shall raise the point of privilege immediately after adoption of the minutes of the previous council meeting.
- The mayor may consult the CAO before ruling on a point of privilege. 36.5
- A point of privilege is not subject to amendment or debate unless a motion 36.6 regarding the point of privilege is put to council.

37. Point of Procedure

- Any member may ask the mayor for an opinion on a point of procedure. 37.1
- When a point of procedure is raised, the member speaking shall immediately 37.2 cease speaking until the mayor responds to the inquiry.

- 37.3 After the member has asked the point of procedure, the mayor shall provide an opinion on the rules of procedure bearing on the matter before council.
- 37.4 The mayor may consult the CAO before providing an opinion on the point of procedure.
- 37.5 A point of procedure is not subject to amendment or debate.
- 37.6 The mayor's answer to a point of procedure is not a ruling, and cannot be appealed to the whole of council.

38. Appeal

- Whenever a member wishes to appeal any ruling of the mayor or a point of order or point of privilege to the whole of council:
 - (a) the motion of appeal, "that the decision of the chair be overruled" shall be made;
 - (b) the member may offer a brief reason for the challenge;
 - (c) the mayor may state the reason for the decision; and
 - (d) following which the question shall be put immediately without debate.
- The mayor shall be governed by the vote of the majority of the members present.
- 38.3 A ruling of the mayor must be appealed immediately after ruling is made or the ruling will be final.

39. Calling a Member to Order

- 39.1 When the mayor calls a member to order, the member shall resume his or her seat, but may afterwards explain his or her position in making the remark for which he or she was called to order.
- In the event that a member refuses to resume his or her seat when called to order, the mayor shall request the deputy mayor, or if the deputy mayor is absent or is the unruly member, any other member of council to move a resolution to remove the unruly member either:
 - (a) for the balance of the meeting,
 - (b) until a time which shall be stated in the motion4, or
 - (c) until the member makes an apology acceptable to council for his or her unruly behavior, whichever shall be the shortest time.
- When the majority of council votes in favour of the resolution, the mayor shall direct the unruly member to leave the council chamber, and if the member refuses to leave, the mayor may:
 - (a) recess the meeting until the person leaves or adjourn the meeting to another day; or
 - (b) direct that law enforcement officials be engaged to assist in the removal of the unruly member.
- When council has directed an unruly member to leave the council chambers, and the member so directed makes an explanation and apology adequate and satisfactory to the council, it may, by a majority vote of the remaining members present, allow the offending member to remain in his or her place if he or she has not left or been removed, or to retake his or her place.

PART V - MOTIONS

40. Motions and Debate

- 40.1 A motion shall express fully and clearly the intent of the mover
- 40.2 A motion shall not be considered unless it has been seconded.
- 40.3 Any member may require the motion under debate to be read at any time during the debate, but not so as to interrupt a member while speaking.
- When a motion is under debate no other motion may be made, except a motion to:
 - (a) amend a motion;
 - (b) refer motion to a council committee or administration for a report back to council;
 - (c) postpone a motion to a fixed date;
 - (d) request that a motion be put to a vote; or
 - (e) adjourn the meeting.
- 40.5 Notwithstanding any other provisions of this bylaw, the member, who moved a motion after a motion is under debate, may, with the consent of council:
 - (a) on his or her own initiative while he or she is speaking on the same; or
 - (b) when requested by another member speaking on the motion;

⁴ The expulsion cannot continue beyond the current meeting.

change the wording of the motion, or agree to a change proposed by another member, if the alteration does not change the intention of the motion.

40.6 Any motions allowed under subsection 44.4 shall be considered in the order in which they were moved.

41. Motion to Amendments

41.1 Except as provided in subsection 45.12, any motion may be amended to:

(a) add words within the motion;

- (b) delete words within the motion; or
- (c) change a word or words within the motion.
- 41.2 The amending motion must be:

(a) relevant to the main motion;

- (b) made while the main motion is under consideration; and
- (c) consistent with the principle embodied in the main motion.
- 41.3 An amending motion may also be amended.
- 41.4 A sub amendment must be:
 - (a) relevant to the original amendment;
 - (b) made while the original amendment is under consideration; and
 - (c) consistent with the intent of either the original amendment or the main motion.
- 41.5 Only two (2) amendments to a motion, an amendment and a sub amendment, are allowed at the same time. When one or both have been dealt with, a further amendment or sub amendment may be entertained.
- 41.6 There is no limit to the number of amendments or sub amendments that may be proposed.
- 41.7 An amendment may be introduced at any stage before the question is put on the main motion provided there is not more than one amendment and one sub amendment before the meeting at one time.
- Any member wishing to move an amendment that is not in order at the time because there are already two amendments before the meeting may state the intention of the proposed amendment, as the proposal may affect the vote on those motions awaiting decision.
- 41.9 The main motion shall not be debated until all amendments to it have been put to a vote.
- 41.10 Amendments shall be put in the reverse order to the order in which they were moved.
- 41.11 When all amendments have been voted on, the main motion incorporating all amendments adopted shall be put to a vote.
- 41.12 No amendments shall be made to the following motions:
 - (a) a motion to adjourn;
 - (b) a motion to defer to a fixed date, except as to the date; and
 - (c) a motion requesting that a motion be put to a vote.

42. Dividing a Motion into Parts

- 42.1 A member may request or the mayor may direct that a motion be divided if the motion contains more than one separate and complete recommendation.
- 42.2 Council shall then vote separately on each recommendation.
- 42.3 A new motion to add a further recommendation is permitted provided:
 - (a) the proposed recommendation is relevant to the original motion;
 - (b) the proposed recommendation does not alter in a significant way the principle embodied in the original motion; and
 - (c) the original motion has been dealt with.

43. Motion Arising

- When a particular matter is before council, a motion arising on the same matter is permitted provided:
 - (a) the proposed motion is related to and rises from the item which has just been considered;
 - (b) the proposed motion does not alter in a significant way the principle embodied in the original motion; and
 - (c) the proposed motion is made before the consideration of any other item of business at the meeting.

44. Request that Motion be put to Vote

A motion requesting that a motion be put to a vote shall not be moved or seconded by a member who has spoken to the original motion.

- 44.2 A motion requesting that a motion be put to a vote shall not be amended or debated.
- 44.3 If a motion requesting that a motion be put to a vote is passed by council, the original motion shall immediately be put to a vote of council without any amendment or debate.
- 44.4 If a motion requesting that a motion be put to a vote is not passed by council, the original question may be amended or debated.

45. Motion to Move to a Closed Meeting

- A member may make a motion that a council meeting move to a closed meeting (in camera).
- 45.2 The motion to move to a closed meeting must:
 - (a) be in accordance with The Local Authority Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act;
 - (b) the titles or subject of the item(s) to be discussed; and
 - (c) include the reason for the council meeting to be held in a closed meeting.
- 45.3 No bylaw or resolution shall be passed during a closed meeting.

46. Motion to Adjourn

- 46.1 A member may move a motion to adjourn a meeting at any time, except when:
 - (a) another member is in possession of the floor;
 - (b) a call for a recorded vote has been made;
 - (c) the members are voting;
 - (d) when council is considering a motion requesting that a motion be put to a vote; or
 - (e) a previous motion to adjourn has been defeated and no other intermediate proceeding has taken place.
- 46.2 A motion to adjourn shall be decided without debate.

47. Motion Contrary to Rules

The mayor may refuse to put to council a motion which is, in the opinion of the mayor, contrary to the rules and privileges of council.

48. Withdrawal of Motions

The mover and seconder of a motion may withdraw it at any time prior to a vote being taken or prior to the motion being amended.

49. Motion to Reconsider

- 49.1 A motion to reconsider shall apply to resolutions only, and shall not apply to bylaws passed by council.
- 49.2 A motion to reconsider is in order whether the original motion passed or failed.
- 49.3 A motion to reconsider may only be made at the same council meeting as the original motion was voted on.
- 49.4 A motion to reconsider must be moved by a member who voted with the prevailing side of the original motion.
- When a motion loses on a tied vote, the prevailing side is those who voted against the motion.
- 49.6 A motion to reconsider may be seconded by any member regardless how the member voted on the original motion.
- 49.7 A motion to reconsider is debatable only if the motion being reconsidered is debatable.
- 49.8 A motion to reconsider cannot be amended.
- 49.9 A motion to reconsider shall require a majority vote of the members present at the meeting.
- 49.10 If a motion to reconsider is adopted, the original motion is immediately placed before council to be reconsidered.
- 49.11 Once a vote on a motion to reconsider has taken place, there shall be no further motion to reconsider that resolution.

50. Motion to Rescind

- 50.1 A motion to rescind shall apply to resolutions only, and shall not apply to bylaws passed by council.
- A motion to rescind is in order only when the original motion passed. No motion to rescind shall be necessary when the original motion failed.

- A motion to rescind may be made at any time following the council meeting at which the original motion was voted on regardless of the time that has elapsed since the original vote was taken.
- A motion to rescind may be moved and seconded by any council member regardless how they voted on the original motion.
- 50.5 A motion to rescind is debatable.
- 50.6 A motion to rescind may be amended.
- 50.7 A motion to rescind shall, in all cases, require a majority vote of all council members to pass.
- 50.8 A motion cannot be rescinded:
 - (a) when the making or calling up of a motion to reconsider is in order;
 - (b) when action on the motion has been carried out in a way that cannot be undone; or
 - (c) when a resignation has been accepted or actions electing or expelling a person from membership or office have been taken.

51. Motion to Postpone

- 51.1 Where a majority of all members decide to postpone a motion to a fixed date, the motion cannot be considered by council until the fixed date.
- Notwithstanding subsection 55.1, council may consider a postponed motion before the fixed date if a majority of members agree that the motion may be considered before that date.
- 51.3 The only amendment allowed to a motion to postpone to a fixed date is to change the date.

52. Motion to Refer

- 52.1 A motion to refer a matter shall not be amended or debated except with respect to the conditions of the referral or the time required to carry out the review.
- 52.2 A member making a referral motion generally should include in the motion:
 - (a) the terms on which the motion is being referred; and
 - (b) the time when the matter is to be returned.

53. Debate on Motion

- No member shall speak more than once to a motion, until each member has been provided an opportunity to speak on the motion, except to explain a material part of their speech which may have been misquoted or misunderstood.
- 53.2 The mover of the motion shall be given the first opportunity to speak.
- 53.3 The mover of the motion shall be allowed a reply at the conclusion of the debate.

54. Legal Advice

54.1 Where a majority of the members present at a council meeting wish to receive legal advice in private, council may recess for a period of time sufficient to receive legal advice.

55. Voting of council

- A member attending a council meeting shall vote at the meeting on a matter before council unless the member is required to abstain from voting pursuant to the Act or any other Act.
- If a member is not required to abstain from voting on a matter before council and abstains from voting, the council member is deemed to have voted in the negative.
 The CAO shall ensure that each abstention is recorded in the minutes of the
- 55.3 The CAO shall ensure that each abstention is recorded in the minutes of the meeting.

56. Voting of Mayor

56.1 The mayor shall vote with the other members on all questions.

57. Majority Decision

Unless a greater percentage of votes is required by any provision of this bylaw, at every council meeting, all questions are to be decided by a majority vote of the members present.

58. Recorded Vote

58.1 Before a vote is taken by council, a member may request that the vote be recorded.

58.2 If a vote is recorded, the minutes must show the names of the members present and whether each voted for or against the proposal or abstained.

59. Tied Vote

59.1 If there are an equal number of votes for and against a resolution or bylaw, the resolution or bylaw is defeated.

PART VI - COUNCIL COMMITTEES

60. Committees of Council

60.1 Subject to any relevant law or bylaw the Mayor shall, at the first meeting of Council in each year submit a list of appointments of the Council Committees listed in the Regina Beach Council's Governance Policy Manual, for Council adoption.

61. Functions and Authority of a Committee

- 61.1 The function of each Committee is laid out in the Governance Policy Manual and the adopted Terms of Reference, which includes but is not limited to the following:
 - o Provide advice to Council:
 - Work with the CAO /Department Head to review an initial operating and capital budget to be forwarded to Council and monitor performance to budget;

Make recommendations on policy to Council;

- Any duties delegated by Council with the exception of those outlined in Section 127 of The Municipalities Act;
- o Increase public awareness.

PART VII - MISCELLANEOUS

62. Bylaw Repealed

Bylaws No. 02/2016, 04/2016, 17/2020 are hereby repealed.

63. Coming Into Force

63.1 This bylaw shall come into force and take effect on the date of the third reading.
